TEACHERS EXPECTATIONS OF STUDENTS!!!

1. Weekly class attendance or a note explaining your absence.
2. Students need to pay attention and show respect to everyone in class.
3. No food, drink or **cell phones** in class. Teacher's have the right to deal with cell phones as they see fit and can result in a strike on the discipline policy.
4. Take part in the class discussions.
5. If you do not know the answer...guess (you might be right)! Do your best that is all we ask.
6. Attend mass weekly.
7. Make prayer and scripture study a part of your daily living.
8. Have your homework done.
9. Be yourself and use your talents. They are true gifts from God.

PARENT EXPECTATIONS!!!

1. Bring your children to mass and class weekly.
2. Be sure your child/children are aware of the discipline policy and expectations.
3. Help with your child's homework.
4. Find answers to your child's questions.
